1. AUTHOR STUDY- Discover a new author and *read at least 2 books by the SAME author.*

Some of my favorite grade 6-8 authors are:

2. GENRE CHALLENGE- *READ 3 books from at least 3 different genre.* Challenge yourself to try something different! If you always read fantasy, try realistic fiction. If you always read mysteries, try historical fiction or fantasy! And remember-graphic novels are a style of writing, not a genre.

Use this checklist to help plan your book talk.

REQUIREMENTS:

Summary of the book (without ending or other surprises/twists), include:

- Setting where & when and how you know
- Main character(s) description that includes physical and personality info
- Conflict what was the main problem and what type of conflict is it
- Plot summary of the idea of the book without giving away too much info
- Point of view who's telling the story and is it 1st person, 3rd person omniscient or limited omniscient
- Genre action/adventure, fantasy, science fiction, realistic fiction, romance, mystery/suspense, historical fiction, biography, autobiography, informational
- Read aloud 1-2 paragraph excerpt from the book.

Review includes:

- Rating of book
- Explanation of rating (why you gave it the score you did)
- Who would be most likely to enjoy or not enjoy reading this book

Example:

Readers who like lively, off beat characters will love getting to know Antsy, the Schwa, and others in their Brooklyn neighborhood

- Your Shelf Talker can be typed or handwritten, but it must be neat without spelling errors.
- Your Shelf Talker must include the Book Title and Author
- Your Shelf Talker should have visual appeal (think pictures, symbols, emojis,)

ILLUSTRATION- Illustrate a scene or a favorite character from your book and write a description.
